Facing the Unexpected: Ask-what could occur on an ATV ride that is unexpected?

EXAMPLES:

- Get lost
- ATV breakdown
- Out of fuel
- Stuck
- Weather change
- Injury

You need to prepare in advance to avoid, or to be able to recover from, the UNEXPECTED

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<p>0:00</p>	<p><u>E = EDUCATE</u></p> <p>The purpose of the Wisconsin ATV Safety Training Program is To promote <u>Safe</u>, <u>Responsible</u> and <u>Ethical</u> (a personal code of conduct) ATV use.</p> <p>Instruction emphasizes the importance of LAWS and REGULATIONS, ETHICS, PERSONAL SAFETY, and the PROPER USE of All Terrain Vehicles. By participating in the program, students will obtain a better understanding of their obligations to the RESOURCES, the LANDOWNER, OTHER ATV users and to THEMSELVES.</p> <p>Chapter One of the Student Manual introduces the student to the <u>RISKS</u> involved in ATV riding and the ways the risks can be reduced.</p> <p><u>Classroom Discussions:</u></p> <p>Ask students how long they have been riding an ATV, type of experience (yard, public trails, farm, etc.), size of ATV.</p>	<p>Student Manual</p>
<p>10:00</p>	<p>Review the DNR Fatality Summary & Review the Operator Accident Report</p> <p><u>D = DEMONSTRATE</u></p> <p>The risks of riding an ATV are: <u>PERSONAL INJURY</u>, <u>DEATH</u> and <u>PROPERTY DAMAGE</u></p> <p>Discuss safety requirements that help reduce the risks:</p> <ol style="list-style-type: none"> 1. Always wear a helmet 2. Avoid excessive speed 3. Never consume drugs or alcohol before or while riding 4. Know your limitations and your ATV's limitations (gain experience) 5. Never carry a passenger unless ATV is designed for two riders 6. Avoid "wheelies" and "jumps" 7. ATV's are for off-road use <u>only</u> 8. Know the area where you will be riding and let someone know where you are going and when you will return 9.
